SPOTLIGHT on the Turkey Resident Office

The TUSEG Resident Office at Incrilik Air Base, which traces its roots to 1950, provides construction administration and inspection functions for projects throughout Turkey. It executes both military construction and operations and maintenance work — from Incirlik down south and the Turkish capital of Ankara to eastern locations in the nation's apricot-growing region. The office also supervises project offices in Tbilisi, Georgia, and Novo Selo, Bulgaria.

It supports the Air Force, U.S. Army Europe, NATO, Department of Defense Dependents Schools-Europe, Office of Defense Cooperation and Missile Defense Agency with contract, engineering and construction management of various projects.

Current ventures at Incirlik include renovation of 336 family housing units, construction of a Combined Community Center; overhaul of the elementary school's heating, ventilation and air-conditioning systems; and an upgrade to the base medical clinic's HVAC and electrical systems.

In addition, the staff is supporting the NATO mission to provide Patriot missiles to Turkey and building a remote forward operating site, which will serve both the Army and local military forces.

The TUSEG Resident Office is comprised of a small but effective and dedicated staff — four Army civilians, three local nationals and a U.S. military engineer.

With work at three active locations in Turkey, the office personnel are always on the move. From construction in the mountains, to work in Ankara, to the multiple projects at Incirlik, the staff is always mobile.

Resident Engineer Tommy Rose said working in Turkey offers the unique challenge of executing construction and engineering projects dedicated to improving security, quality of life and mission capabilities within the country.

Turkey is a vibrant place to work and live. The local nationals and Army civilians enjoy the moderate Mediterranean climate, rich cuisine, strong coffee, vast historical sites and beaches of the Turquoise Coast.

The transcontinental country, which borders southeastern Europe and western Asia, features a diverse culture and blend of various elements and influences. It strives to be a contemporary state while maintaining traditional religious and historical values.

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








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Operations Security

Everyone plays a role in force protection

Recent events serve as a reminder that everyone plays a role in force protection and personal safety.

Being consistently aware of one's surroundings, immediately reporting anything that looks suspicious, and keeping vehicles and residences secured are all important ways individuals contribute to everyone's safety and well-being. While not every situation can be prevented or predicted – recent incidents in Boston and Newtown, Conn., are grim reminders – they underscore the very real threat that requires everyone to be aware of one's surroundings.

An April 12 incident at the Hainerberg Shopping Center in Wiesbaden, Germany, is a good example. While it turned out to be a false alarm – Pond Security guards and emergency responders quickly reacted to remarks by a delivery driver about a possible bomb – it was a reminder of the need for vigilance.

In this case, the gate was closed, a safe zone was established around the suspected vehicle and military police evacuated people to a safe area. Explosives dogs also were called to the scene, and the German polizei assisted with traffic control and questioning the suspect. After the vehicle and area were deemed safe by emergency responders, the garrison commander gave the "all clear" and the gate was reopened.
