### US, Romania complete Aegis Ashore



U.S. and Romanian officials inaugurated the new Aegis Ashore Phase II radar site and missile battery Dec. 18 during a ceremony in Bucharest, declaring it "technically capable."

U.S. Army Corps of Engineers Europe District has worked closely with the Missile Defense Agency, U.S. Navy and Romanian officials to finish the \$170 million missile defense complex and meet a presidential mandate for operational capacity by the end of 2015.

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### Military construction to ramp up in Poland

SLUPSK, Poland–USACE expects to break ground on another Aegis Ashore complex by next summer as attention turns toward Phase III of the European Phased Adaptive Approach to ballistic missile defense at Redzikowo Air Base.



In addition to the BMD shield, the Department of Defense and Polish Ministry of National Defense continue to cooperate on planning and execution of projects supporting the European Reassurance Initiative.



## 'Wall-breaking' held for USARAF project



VICENZA, Italy – Leaders and stakeholders took part in a "wallbreaking" ceremony Dec. 9 for the future U.S. Army Africa headquarters at Caserma Del Din. "This is the largest renovation project we've done for USARAF,"

said Mediterranean Resident Office Engineer Tim Wood. "They're a great partner to work with, and we're glad for the opportunity to help them consolidate all their staff in a modern headquarters. It's interesting to be renovating historic buildings from the Mussolini era into 21st-century standards."

# **SPOTLIGHT** on the Caucasus Project Office

Europe District's Caucasus Project Office in Tbilisi, Georgia, covers three countries: the host republic, Azerbaijan and Armenia. Most of its projects are tied to European Command's Humanitarian Assistance Program, typically involving the renovation or construction of a clinic, school or community center, as well as water-supply system rehabilitation to different regions.

The office also implements the U.S. Export Control and Related Border Security program, known as EXBS, overseeing construction of the "green border" between Georgia and Azerbaijan. The effort delivers new buildings for border police, including accommodation, offices and training areas with fully equipped facilities.

The Caucasus team is comprised of an American project engineer and several local nationals — two engineers, a program coordinator and administrative assistant. With about 80 percent of projects in remote locations, the staff frequently drives five to eight hours just to reach a job site. But the work is highly rewarding.

"We are very friendly and supportive of each other," says Program Coordinator Nana Kacheishvili. "Everything we accomplish is a result of good teamwork. ... Our projects are performed with high quality, on time and within budget. With a few amount of dollars, it's amazing how much happiness you can bring to a community. Projects turn into a big event for the community, and they bring relief in lifestyle and improvement of conditions."

Recently completed humanitarian-assistance projects in Armenia include the Gyumri Child Care and Protection Boarding School, Kharbred Specialized Orphanage and Meghri Clinic. In Georgia, the team upgraded a kindergarten and school for the deaf and handled a dredging project in Poti Sea Port for EXBS.

In 2016, the Caucasus Project Office expects to finish two efforts in Georgia: a new wing at the Asylum Seeker Center in Martkopi and the Management Department Rescue Training Center. It's also renovating Kindergarten #59 in Armenia and managing Azerbaijan water-supply improvements.

Project Engineer Gwen Nelson has served in Tbilisi since the summer of 2013. "I love living and working in this area," she said. "The Caucasus region is beautiful. Each country is unique, and the people are great."

Georgia is renowned for its wine - Nelson enjoys the free samples offered at grocery stores and wine shops. The cuisine and lemonade are distinctive here, too.

"Armenia is different in that you have additional mountains you have to cross and it's drier in some areas," she added. "Azerbaijan is very flat in a lot of areas. ... All of these countries are free range. There are little pesticides utilized in the growing of vegetables and fruits. This makes all the food taste extremely fresh."
