After attacks, US issues travel warning



WASHINGTON – Americans should be alert to possible travel risks, especially during the holidays, following increased terrorist threats around the world, the State Department warned recently, according to a

report by The Associated Press.

A travel alert, in effect until Feb. 24, said current information suggests that militants with the Islamic State, al-Qaida, Boko Haram and other terrorist groups continue to plan attacks in multiple regions.



Special education center opens in Tunisia

ARIANA, Tunisia – U.S. Deputy Chief of Mission Kathleen Hanson inaugurated a \$675,000 extension to a special education vocational training center Nov. 3 that was funded by Africa Command's humanitarian-assistance program.

SPOTLIGHT on Program Management Branch



The Program Management Branch supports the management and oversight of multiple key and strategic programs in Europe District's area of responsibility such as military construction, the Defense Health Agency, Department of Defense Education Activity and other government agencies. The branch provides support to overall financial management and data reporting of these various programs to include fiscal closeout. Strategically placed regional program managers are embedded with district partners and stakeholders.

Anchored at the Amelia Earhart Center in Wiesbaden, Germany, the Program Management Branch plays a pivotal role in driving the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers Europe District mission.

Providing business and statistical assessment for planning, program execution, financial management, closeout, resource and administrative requirements, automated management information systems and upward reporting are among its core functions. The branch prepares workload forecasts, coordinates fiscal and manpower issues with the district's Resource Management Office, and organizes monthly Project Review Board meetings for leadership.

The team's managers represent district partner interests at the program level through communication of expectations, timely upward reporting, defining standards and requirements, and establishing and tracking milestones and metrics to ensure consistency across Europe District. They also direct program fund requests through higher headquarters and partner representatives, control and manage budgets, engage in conflict resolution, streamline priorities, and elevate the profile of key programs through development of new work requirements with stakeholders.

"The work here at Europe District is very challenging – like nowhere else in the world – but the reward of accomplishment is great," said Omar Chavez, senior project manager on the Rhine Ordnance Barracks Medical Center Replacement. "Your co-workers become a part of your extended family, and those are friendships that we take back with us on our journeys home."

Living and working in Germany gives team members an abundance of unique tourist opportunities and the chance to meet people from different backgrounds around Europe.

"I enjoy the new experiences of working within Germany and with the German Bauamts, along with learning the German work and cultures," said Chris Miranda, a program manager. "What I enjoy about living in Germany is the opportunity to travel in and around Europe with my family."

Chavez says Wiesbaden sits in close proximity to a multitude of great destinations and weekend getaways, making travel on the Continent even easier.

"It is a true privilege to live, work and play in Germany," he added. "To experience the various diverse cultures, languages, foods and be able to share that with our children and family that come to visit is a very rewarding experience."


